New Tax Collector Will Assure Residents Of Face To Face Collection at 132 S. Main Street And Adds Evening Hours

The Spring 2025 Primary Election last May did not bring any candidates for the position of Borough Tax Collector so the Borough Treasurer and the Finance Committee had to develop a contingency plan for how Borough real estate taxes would be collected going forward. Inquiries were made to Berkheimer and also Keystone Collections Group to seek proposals and rates for continued regular real estate tax collections. Neither would provide an office presence preferring to do online or mail-in services only. Our Borough has, in the past, enjoyed the luxury of walk up payments in a convenient office on Main Street where receipts could be hand-stamped and pleasantries could be exchanged with our collector and others waiting in line. Without a candidate on the ballot or a write-in person, it looked like that in person collection would be at an end and we would join a majority of local townships who have already gone with the mail-in route for all collections. Everything changed with the November write-in campaign of John Muscler who received over 250 write-in votes and is now our collector for the next four years. March of 2026 saw a steady stream of property owners at his office window, some of whom enjoyed the new Tuesday evening 5:00 pm - 7:00 pm expanded evening hours in addition to his Monday 9:00 am till noon hours. **The tax collector can be reached at 610-746-1507 or e-mailed at taxcollector@nazarethboroughpa.gov.**

Council Chambers Addition and Outdoor Bathrooms Added At Veteran's Memorial Square

Following almost twenty months of construction, Council Chambers at 159 West Center Street is once again home to Nazareth Borough Council for its monthly meetings. The new addition, nearly an exact duplicate of the 1947 constructed building which once was home to the Nazareth Memorial

Library, offers first floor handicapped bathrooms, outdoor accessible bathrooms for those using the nearby playground and baseball field plus nearly 2,000 square feet of record storage space in the basement. An entirely new air conditioning system will serve both the original structure and the new addition while a new sound system will allow for better audio for meeting attendees. At some point this year, a new porch will replace what is currently there on the east side while general entry to the building will now be from the Church Street side of the building with an ADA ramp installed to accommodate handicapped citizens. Council used the construction period to make its own upgrades while totally replacing the existing roof, repainting the entire interior, replacing all visitor chairs and installing all new carpeting. A spacious vestibule between both structures welcomes guests and contains a small office. All exterior landscaping will complete the project before Council and the Municipal Authority jointly host a dedication ceremony open to all. A date for that grand re-opening event has not been set but it will be open to all residents and visitors alike.

Borough Installs New Chief of Police Randall Pompei

Our Tenth Chief Since 1946

Incoming Chief Randall S. Pompei Jr. brings more than two decades of public safety experience and a lifelong commitment to serving the community. Beginning his career in emergency medical services across the Lehigh Valley and Montgomery County, Chief Pompei gained hands-on expertise in crisis response, patient care, and interagency coordination. His early experiences in EMS fostered teamwork, resilience, and a deep dedication to community service, qualities that continue to guide his leadership today.

While serving with Nazareth EMS, Chief Pompei developed a profound understanding of the Nazareth community, building strong relationships with residents, local officials, and public leaders. This foundation shaped his approach to policing when he joined the Nazareth Police Department over a decade ago. He has spent more than eight years in supervisory roles, mentoring officers and promoting a culture of professionalism, integrity, and continuous improvement. Chief Pompei is recognized for his investigative skills, having led and supported complex investigations, including many as a member of the Northampton County Drug Task Force.

Chief Pompei's commitment to professional development is extensive and distinguished. He has completed the full FBI-LEEDA Trilogy (Supervisor, Command, and Executive Leadership Institutes), which provided advanced instruction in leadership,

ethics, organizational management, and decision-making at all levels of law enforcement. He has also completed multiple executive-level programs through Penn State Outreach, including Police Supervisory In-Service Training, High Impact Supervision, Police Executive Development, and Strategic Leadership. A highlight of his training is graduation from Northwestern University's Police Staff and Command program (Class #611), widely recognized as one of the nation's leading programs for law enforcement executives. This rigorous program emphasizes advanced command-level skills, organizational theory, strategic management, leadership ethics, and contemporary policing challenges, equipping Chief Pompei with a national perspective on best practices and preparing him to lead a complex organization with vision, professionalism, and strategic foresight.

Under his leadership, the Nazareth Police Department will continue as a PLEAC-accredited agency, reflecting its commitment to excellence, accountability, transparency, and nationally recognized law enforcement standards. Chief Pompei has been honored throughout his career with numerous letters of accommodation, unit citations, a letter of valor, and the 2024 Nathan Ogden Award from the Northampton County Chiefs of Police Association.

Since September 2025, Chief Pompei has overseen day-to-day operations under the mentorship of outgoing Chief of Police Randall Miller, and he officially assumed the role of Chief of Police on January 1, 2026. His priorities include strengthening community partnerships, enhancing officer development, promoting transparency, and fostering a culture of trust, service, and integrity.

Raised in northern Montgomery County, Chief Pompei embodies the values of hard work, integrity, and community dedication. He is married and has one son, recently honorably discharged from the United States Marine Corps, whose service he deeply admires.

Through decades of service in EMS and law enforcement, combined with extensive specialized training and executive leadership programs, Chief Randall S. Pompei Jr. has built a career defined by dedication, investigative excellence, and a deep connection to the community. He is committed to leading the PLEAC-accredited Nazareth Police Department into a future defined by professionalism, excellence, and public trust.

Pompei was formally sworn as the new Chief at the Borough's January 5, 2026 Business Meeting and joins Harry Miller, John Macy, Asher Hahn, Paul Traupman, Joseph Roccasanto, Bruce Ruch, Michael Sinclair, Thomas Trachta and Randall Miller on the list of Nazareth Police Chiefs since 1946.

Pool and Park Ready For Another Banner Summer

Saturday, May 23, 2026 will mark the start of another three month Pool season in what many call the area's best swimming facility. The even better news for swimmers is that there are no 2026 increases in rates for Pool use to include daily "walk-up" admissions and Season Passes too. Hours of operation remain the same with daily noon openings and scheduled closing at 7:00 pm. The Borough reserves the right to close the Pool earlier after 5:00 pm for lack of patronage as has always been the case in years past. There will be two cycles of Pool Parties offered each day with afternoon parties starting at 1:00 pm and evening parties beginning at 5:30 pm. Pool Passes can be purchased and Pool Parties can be reserved on the Borough's RecDesk site where all Pool details and pavilion rentals can be done remotely with a credit card payment. the Pool Pass portal opens yearly on March 1st while Pool Parties can be reserved after April 1st. Newly Passed Ordinance #902 Prohibits Sports Equipment on Borough Streets

At its March 2026 Business Meeting, Council passed Ordinance #903 which prohibits obstructions on Borough streets and within right-of-ways. Specifically, the amendment to Chapter 21 - Streets and Sidewalks addresses sports equipment like basketball hoops which hamper residential parking and make refuse and recycling pickups difficult for Borough haulers. The ordinance language reads..."no person shall place any fixed or portable basketball net or backboard, or other item of sports or recreational equipment or apparatus in any public right-of-way created and used primarily for public vehicular traffic in the Borough of Nazareth, nor shall such equipment or apparatus be placed on private property in the vicinity of any public right-of-way such that the use of the equipment or apparatus will tend to cause an individual to be in and about the public right-of-way".

Work Continues On Moravian Woods/Black Rock

Following the official June 2025 purchase of Black Rock, now to be called Moravian Woods, the Borough's Public Works crew dug in and began the extensive cleanup needed to make the 41 acres a functioning recreation facility. Our crew got off to a good start in the second half of 2025 but extensive work remains with downed trees needed to be removed plus cleanup of the stone bridges and Springhouse at the center of the wooded acreage.

The installation of a trail system will then follow along with entry portals at two or three points before some nature stations, lookout points and perhaps a picnic area or two can be added. As of now, no firm plans are in place other than the initial cleanup as the Borough awaits the development of a Park Master Plan and the substantial work that will follow according to that plan.

New Pierce Fire Pumper Arrives With Much Deserved Fanfare

Following receipt of a \$700,000 LSA Grant and a three year custom build, our Vigilance Hose Fire Company took possession of its new Pierce Fire Pumper on November 2, 2025. Proud volunteer firefighters and our dedicated fire chiefs watched with pride as the Pumper was greeted at the South Broad Street Fire Station and a traditional "back-in" ceremony was held to celebrate the addition to our fleet of this coveted fire vehicle. Council's Fire and Public Property Committees have joined together in the past three years to begin extensive renovations to the Firehouse and to upgrade vehicles and equipment. In late 2023, a new floor was poured for the entire Fire facility complete with a urethane floor and attractive paint scheme while security surveillance cameras were added during 2025. Next on the wish list for 2027 and beyond is a total interior renovation of the locker room, bathrooms, training areas and offices through "hoped for" grant funding in the 2026 LSA Statewide Grant cycle.

Home Ownership Comes With Spring/Summer Property Maintenance Responsibilities... Just A Reminder

Here Are Some Things To Know About The Borough Property Maintenance Code

Homes and properties must be well maintained both inside and outside according to the 2021 International Property Maintenance Code (IPMC). To keep neighborhoods safe, healthy and vibrant, the code regulations provide minimum maintenance and life safety standards, and they apply to residential and commercial properties as well. Prior to 2021, property maintenance inspections were only performed on a complaint driven basis. Beginning in 2021, the Borough, utilizing Barry Isett Engineering, began performing block by block exterior inspections of every property in the Borough, with the goal of inspecting every property at least once within a two year time period. An inspection will also be initiated if the Isett Group receives a complaint about a specific property from a neighbor or passerby. Common examples of code violations are provided below.

- Missing, clogged or defective rain gutters and downspouts.
- Peeling, flaking or missing paint on exterior surfaces such as soffits, eaves, roof overhangs, window frames, doors and trim.
- Broken, cracked or missing windows.
- Structural defects to chimneys/decks/porches, etc.
- Porch supports are to be maintained in a safe and sound condition and in good repair.
- Homes should have address numbers (premise identification) displayed on the front of the property
- Outdoor structures shall be maintained and in good repair. This includes retaining walls, fences, sheds, garages, etc.
- Grass and weeds must be maintained at a height no more than 6 inches. Upon failure to maintain grass/weeds a Borough Contractor will remedy the violation at the homeowner's expense.

Please Remember for the Current Grass and Weed Season:

Grass and weeds must be maintained to a maximum height of 6 inches. Any growth beyond this height may result in a fine. Multiple offenses within the same year will result in higher fees for each offense.

- Storage of trash or rubbish on the exterior of the property. All trash being placed for collection must be stored in a leak proof, watertight container, with a sealed lid.

- The IPMC also provides minimum standards for the interior condition of a property, including the installation and location of smoke detectors, heating, ventilation, lighting, plumbing, mechanical and means of egress. Other than during a routine residential rental permit inspections, it is extremely rare the Borough would conduct an interior inspection of a residential property. Even then it would only be conducted with a property owner's permission.

If a code violation is observed at a property, a letter will be sent via certified and first class mail to the owner and address listed on the tax records. That letter will contain the section of the IPMC there is a violation(s) of, a description of the violation, what must be done to remediate the violation, a time frame for compliance, the penalty for failure to comply and contact information for Borough staff. If you are not able to comply with the notice within the stated compliance time frame due to reasonable circumstances, please contact me, your Code Officer, Anthony DiSante, at 610-759-1547 to discuss the possibility of a time extension being granted.

When a property owner does not voluntarily comply with a violation notice within the stated compliance period, and has not contacted our Code Officer to request a time extension, the Borough will file a non-criminal citation with the local magistrate. Applicable fines are set by the magistrate, typically ranging from \$100 to \$1,000, depending on the nature of the violation and how long the violation has continued. In extreme cases of continued non-compliance, the Borough may file for a court order to enter the property and remediate the violation on behalf of the owner and placing a lien on the property for all associated costs.

Borough Receives More Grant Funding For Additional Park and Vehicle Improvements

January 2026 brought the Borough more great grant news as a DCED Parks, Trails and Recreation Grant for a Park Master Plan was received followed by a DCNR Community Conservation Grant to cover all of the Part Two expenses for the purchase of Moravian Woods, formerly known as Black Rock. More good news arrived with another DCED Grant to fund the purchase of a 2026 Chevrolet Tahoe for our Public Works Department along with a Public Safety Grant to fund a Police technology equipment purchase. In total, close to \$450,000 in new grant money was awarded to our Borough in the month of January alone. In the first half of 2025, over \$1.3 million in additional grant funding was awarded to the Borough allowing for the purchase of the new Fire Pumper, a new Chevrolet dump truck, funding for new handicapped bathrooms at Essroc Fields and the first half of the funding...\$350,000... for the purchase of the 41.2 acre Black Rock/Moravian Woods parcel.

Council Considers Adding An Inclusive Handicapped Playground At Essroc Fields/Kim Kromer Park

Following several resident inquiries and learning of possible grant opportunities, the Borough's Public Property Committee is seeking design options and state funding to add an "Inclusive Playground" at Kim Kromer Park. The facility would be geared to serve handicapped young children and even older disabled residents who cannot currently take advantage of the multiple parks and playgrounds that the Borough offers. Public Property Chairman Carl Strye and his committee met with state field representative Lorne Possinger for a site tour and discussions about what options the Borough has with state sponsored funding for this type of "inclusive" play area to include access paths, handicapped parking and bathrooms plus hardscape walkways to accommodate wheelchairs and walkers. A DCED Parks, Trails and Recreation Grant will be submitted by the Borough Secretary for the needed funds with the hope for a possible January 2027 grant award.

Gas Line Replacements Continue As Motorists Struggle With Detours, Delays And Bumpy Streets

UGI's six year crusade to replace its aging natural gas line infrastructure in our Borough will continue throughout all of 2026. Much work, to include street resurfacing, remains to be done. Parts of the Downtown on Belvidere Street and Mauch Chunk Street are far from completion and those two streets in particular are high volume roadways which see never ending detours and flagmen directing vehicles to other streets. Sections of South Main Street are now complete and have seen resurfacing to the delight of many who regularly use that artery but High Street, South Green Street and a portion of North Broad Street are areas where the problems continue. No street however, compares to areas of Mauch Chunk Street where motorists are challenged until they reach the Main Street light. If they turn left or right at the light...problem solved...but if they proceed onto Belvidere Street, a whole new challenge awaits them. The entire Borough will be in a whole new and better place when the process is finally complete but for now it seems like a "never ending and tortuous journey".

New Outdoor "Heated" Bathrooms Will Be Added To Essroc Fields Through Grant Funding

DCED grant funds and money from the Borough's Sanitation Fund will be used to add outdoor, heated, handicapped bathrooms at Essroc Fields. The new facility, scheduled to be constructed in the Fall of 2026, will serve the soccer fields, the Sauerzopf Park Playground, the picnic pavilion, the West End Walking Trails and the Borough's Yard Waste drop-off facility, all at Kim Kromer Park. To date, \$90,000 in grant funding has been received while an additional \$60,000 to \$80,000 of Sanitation funding has been appropriated and will be required to complete the project. A new gas line that crosses the job site from Seip Avenue and that ends at the Public Works Garage, will provide the needed energy to heat the bathrooms while providing more cost effective heating to the Highway Department headquarters too.

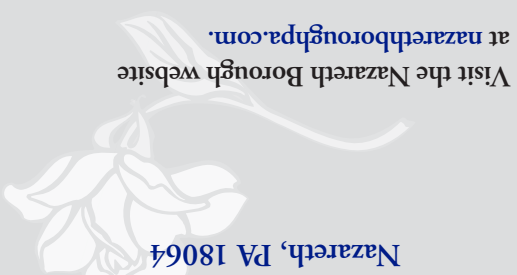
